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If the sonority was one pole of the high quality, the almost flawless intonation between the different instruments was the other pole that made the evening a celebration of chamber music. The fact that oboist Maria Carmona Tobella scraped together all her knowledge of German between the pieces and tried to convey her exuberant enthusiasm for the music with brief introductions of the works was not only a charming gesture but was testimony to the flaming passion for her own cause. This is how it should be and not otherwise!
