

The Clarinet Trio Anthology

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Nino Rota's trio, written in 1973, sparkles with virtuosity, and the artists perform it with ease and humour. The final 'Allegrissimo' is breathtaking in its storming run, the three simply smile away any stupendous difficulties. And the fermatas, in which Ottensamer lets the final notes shimmer excitingly, are almost dreamlike. In between, a metallic plop: Stephan Koncz, unlike the high A string of his cello, shows nerves of steel as he brings the sensual Adagio to a thrilling conclusion on the remaining three low strings. A fascinating encounter with brilliant soloists.

What D. Ottensamer, Traxler and Koncz offer musically is unparalleled in terms of technical mastery, the dialectical discourse between the three instruments, the expressivity, but also the bandwidth of musical finesse, the art of phrasing and the dynamic range of the individual musicians. Daniel Ottensamer walks on dreamscapes of differentiated shading in an intoxicating mood, he masters velvety piani as well as great dramatic excess like hardly anyone else. Christoph Traxler whirls through the centuries of musical history in a dance-like, lively manner and with rapid, sparkling runs, Stephan Koncz underpins the banter and escapades



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of the upper registers with a rich tone, seduces in a flattering manner or elegantly mingles coquettishly with a light expression in the intimate interplay.
