This season's most classic programme, but with a twist. Swedish romantic composer Stenhammar may still be unknown to many, yet his 6th and final string quartet is undoubtedly a work of great integrity and striking natural beauty.

The piece includes auxiliary instruments like music boxes and harmonicas and is of highly atmospheric, unsettling and challenging music that commands a spell on the listener. Through a continuous narrative (with the option of forgoing applause between pieces), we journey from the dark intensity of Kendall via the spellbinding twilight zones of Purcell and Bartók to the prevailing light of Beethoven.

The Marmen Quartet is situated in London but it's members come from four different places in the world; Sweden, Switzerland, Ireland and New Zealand. In this programme, we present one piece from each country in a set of musical "postcards".

Garth Knox, violist of the Arditti Quartet and composer, took a "meta" approach to the relationship between music and letters by instructing the four members of the Marmen Quartet to each write him a secret letter, responding to a number of questions. These letters were destroyed after reading, their contents only surviving, disquised, as part of the composition.

Continuing the theme of geography and travel, here is an adventurous programme in collaboration with award winning Turkish pianist Can Çakmur. We follow the original route of the Orient Express, which extended from Paris in the west, to Istanbul in the east, when it began operation in 1883. Two of the stops along the way were Vienna and Budapest, where the definitions between west and east start to blur.
